Unable to Go to Confession

- 2. Pledge that you will go to the Sacrament of Reconciliation as soon as you are able and it is safe to do so.
- 3. Make an Act of Contrition:

DEVOTIONS - The Rosary

The Rosary is a Scripture-based prayer. It begins with the Apostles' Creed, which summarizes the great mysteries of the Catholic faith. The Our Father, which introduces each mystery, is from the Gospels. The first part of the Hail Mary is the angel's words announcing Christ's birth and Elizabeth's greeting to Mary. St. Pius V officially added the second part of the Hail Mary. The Mysteries of the Rosary center on the events of Christ's life. There are four sets of Mysteries: Joyful, Sorrowful, Glorious and--added by Saint John Paul II in 2002--the Luminous.

The repetition in the Rosary is meant to lead one into restful and contemplative prayer related to each Mystery. The gentle repetition of the words helps us to enter into the silence of our hearts, where Christ's spirit dwells. The Rosary can be said privately or with a group.

Five Joyful Mysteries are traditionally prayed on Mondays, Saturdays, and, during the season of Advent, on Sundays:

- 1. The Annunciation
- 2. The Visitation
- 3. The Nativity
- 4. The Presentation in the Temple
- 5. The Finding in the Temple

The Five Sorrowful Mysteries are traditionally prayed on Tuesdays, Fridays and, during the season of Lent, on Sundays:

- 1. The Agony in the Garden
- 2. The Scourging at the Pillar
- 3. The Crowning with Thorns
- 4. The Carrying of the Cross
- 5. The Crucifixion and Death

The Five Glorious Mysteries are traditionally prayed on Wednesdays and outside the seasons of Advent and Lent, on Sundays:

- 1. The Resurrection
- 2. The Ascension
- 3. The Descent of the Holy Spirit
- 4. The Assumption
- 5. The Coronation of Mary

The Five Luminous Mysteries are traditionally prayed on Thursdays:

- 1. The Baptism of Christ in the Jordan
- 2. The Wedding Feast at Cana
- 3. Jesus' Proclamation of the Coming of the Kingdom of God
- 4. The Transfiguration
- 5. The Institution of the Eucharist

Praying the Rosary



Familiarize yourself and/or your group with the prayers of the rosary.

- 1. Make the Sign of the Cross.
- 2. Holding the Crucifix, say the Apostles' Creed.
- 3. On the first bead, say an Our Father.
- 4. Say one Hail Mary on each of the next three beads.
- 5. Say the Glory Be
- 6. For each of the five decades, announce the Mystery (perhaps followed by a brief reading from Scripture) then say the Our Father.
- 7. While fingering each of the ten beads of the decade, next say ten Hail Marys while meditating on the Mystery. Then say a Glory Be.

(After finishing each decade, some say the following prayer requested by the Blessed Virgin Mary at Fatima: O my Jesus, forgive us our sins, save us from the fires of hell; lead all souls to Heaven, especially those who have most need of your mercy.)

8. After saying the five decades, say the Hail, Holy Queen, followed by this dialogue and prayer:

V. Pray for us, O holy Mother of God.
R. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.
Let us pray: O God, whose Only Begotten Son, by his life, Death, and Resurrection, has purchased for us the rewards of eternal life, grant, we beseech thee, that while meditating on these mysteries of the most holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we may imitate what they contain and obtain what they promise, through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

The Way of the Cross According to St. Matthew

Leader: In the Name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. **All:** Amen

(Matthew 26: 21-30)

Leader: The Sacred Triduum begins at the Lord's Supper. The Eucharist not only brings us into the mystery of the Paschal Mystery, it also strengthens our faith. This building and strengthening of faith helps us to persevere in faith and our identity as children of God as we face trials and struggles, not only in our daily lives, but also in our spiritual lives.


Our lives as Christians involve a lifetime journey of conversion, turning our hearts and minds more and more to the Lord. This requires commitment, patience and spiritual endurance as we learn to let go of our ways and our views and unite our minds and hearts to God. At Holy Thursday, Jesus tells us in the Gospel of John, "I have given you a model to follow, so that as I have done for you, you should also do." (John 13:15)

Let us follow the Lord's example. Let us walk the way of His Passion, uniting our struggles, our sufferings and our crosses with his, that we may share His joy and gift of New Life.

THE FIRST STATION

Leader: The First Station: Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane We adore you O Christ and we praise you. All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

(Matthew 26:36-45)



We also see the power of prayer. In the prayerful encounter with the Father, Jesus remains true to who he is and what he is about. Even in the stress of the situation, it is a loving encounter and love gives Jesus the strength to persevere. He recognizes the limitations of human nature. Even those who love will sometimes disappoint. Yet love allows us to forgive, to not give up on others.

The Garden also challenges us to recognize the opportunities we have to support the suffering Christ. Those who are ill, who suffer from addiction, depression or anxiety. Those struggling with unemployment, lack of having other basic needs. They need our love, our support, our presence. Through us, Christ reaches out to them to lift them up, to strengthen them and encourage them. With the Lord's love and support, they are able to meet their challenges head on and to persevere in journey.

THE SECOND STATION

Leader: Second Station: Jesus betrayed by Judas, is arrested. We adore you O Christ and we praise you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

(Matthew 26:47-50)



Meditation:Three thoughts surface on this scene.Betrayed by a kiss. What a contradiction! What is supposed to be a sign of love and affection, of commitment, loyalty and friendship. In human hands it becomes a sign of betrayal. The exact opposite of what it symbolizes. The disciples flee. How that must of stung. Faced with an angry mob, a situation that could quickly escalate and result in great violence and Jesus is left alone.

"Do you think that I cannot call upon my Father..." (Matthew 26:53). It could have ended there. It would have been easy enough to do, but it would not have been the way of love. Have we been hurt by one we've loved? Have we been left alone faced with a great challenge or uncertainty? Have we been tempted to go with what seemed to be the easy way out?

THE THIRD STATION

Leader: Third Station: Jesus is brought to the Sanhedrin We adore you O Christ and we praise you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

(Matthew 57-65)

Meditation: A trial. A process created by humanity to ensure justice. Yet, like many manmade things, can sometimes be manipulated away from truth.

Think of the phrase uttered by the High Priest for a moment: "I order you to tells us under oath, before the living God whether you are the Messiah, the Son of God."

It is a statement that refuses to seek the truth. If he was interested in seeking the truth, would he actually put himself in a situation that might be an attempt to place himself in a position higher than the Messiah?

Yet, that is exactly what he does, because he has determined that he knows the Truth. Do we presume God to be subservient to us at times? How about our actions? Are our concerns, wants, desires more important than God?

THE FOURTH STATION

Leader: Fourth Station: Jesus is denied by Peter We adore you O Christ and we praise you. All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.


(Matthew 26:69-75)


Meditation: Once again in the scriptures we see an example of Peter getting in his own way. How often does that happen to us? Despite our promises, vows, declarations, our best intentions, how often do we fall?


It seems that we cannot shed ourselves of that same sin we've struggled with for a long time, perhaps for years.

Fear paralyzes Peter. Fear leads him to try justifying his denial of God. Yet, when he reflects on what he has done, he is overcome with remorse.

Are we saddened by our failures? Angry at ourselves for our actions? We look to Peter: he weeps bitterly our of love and desire for Jesus Christ. He seeks the Lord's forgiveness. So shouldn't we.







THE FIFTH STATION

Leader: Fifth Station: Death of Judas We adore you O Christ, and we praise you. All: Because of your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

Matthew 27:3-10

Meditation: As a result of greed, Judas chooses a path that he would normally have found repulsive: he betrays the one he loves. He soon recognizes what he has done is greatly troubled and is distraught. How could he have done such a thing. In his sorrow, he keeps his focus on himself. As a result he isn't able to forgive himself, nor seek forgiveness from those he hurt. In keeping the pain and sorrow to himself, it leads to his destruction.

At times we will fail in living as disciples of the Lord. We will feel real sorrow at our failures. However, the Lord's love for us is so deep, he offers us his forgiveness, regardless of our sin. We need to be open to receiving it.

THE SIXTH STATION

Leader: Sixth Station: Jesus is judged by PilateWe adore you O Christ and we praise you.All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

(Matthew 27:11-14)

Meditation: Once again Jesus refuses to engage in this manipulation of the truth. It is better to remain speechless than to participate in a system of justice that has broken down.

Have you ever felt this helpless - in a situation where no one wants to listen to your truth, perhaps to your story?

Or have you ever joined the other side - the crowd, the ones in power, and closed your mind to a challenging truth - even from someone you might know well, perhaps one you loved? How can we become more like Jesus here? Can we let ourselves be vulnerable, and yet remain grounded and centered, putting our trust ultimately in our God?





THE SEVENTH STATION

Leader: Seventh Station: Jesus is condemned. We adore you O Christ and we praise you. All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

(Matthew 27:15-26)

Meditation: Have you ever thought how greed and jealousy can corrupt justice or the search for truth? In this case, corrupt thinking frees the guilty and condemns the innocent. Pilate tried to wash away his guilt and responsibility. Does it work?

His order resulted in the release of the criminal.

His order resulted in Jesus being scourged.

His order resulted in Jesus being crucified.

Pilate's hand washing ritual didn't change any of that. His self-made ritual couldn't bring him consolation.

Are there times when I try to remove my responsibility or guilt, or justify my lack of action rather than standing up to injustice?

Perhaps it is easier to lay blame elsewhere than to take a stand.

Perhaps in deflecting attention elsewhere, I don't have to deal with my own weaknesses and failures.

THE EIGHTH STATION

Leader: Eighth Station: Jesus is scourged and crowned

We adore you O Christ and we praise you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world



(Matthew 27:27-31)

Meditation: Human praise can come and go. It can quickly change.

We put so much energy and so much effort to gain the praise of others. Yet that praise is temporary at best. Jealousy, greed, envy, selfishness can quickly turn others against us. Praise can turn to jeers and shouts of judgment and anger.

The Lord continually calls us to Himself. He invites us to fix our gaze and desire on Him. He offers us a peace and joy that is forever.



THE NINTH STATION

Leader: Ninth Station: Jesus is helped by Simon Cyrenian We adore you O Christ and we praise you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

(Matthew 27:32)

Meditation: Human beings are not meant to be alone. We need others to flourish. Matthew tells us elsewhere in his Gospel, "where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in your midst."

The Lord reaches out to us through others, To love us, to console us, to help us and to encourage us.

How have I helped the Lord in bearing His cross?

What crosses do I need to allow someone to help me with?

All: Our Father

THE TENTH STATION

Leader: Tenth Station: Jesus is CrucifiedWe adore you O Christ and we praise you.All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

(Matthew 27:33-38)



Meditation: The indignity continues. When faced with the Truth, humility seeks to destroy it. His preaching challenged the status quo. His works of healing the poor, of encouraging the downtrodden threatens the social structures accepted by many, including those in power. So humanity seeks to destroy him, to silence his message.

His death isn't enough though. They find it necessary to inflict as much pain as possible in the process: nailed to a cross, left in the hot sun. His suffering ignored.

We should recall this scene in our moments of suffering, of pain and abandonment. The Lord has experienced it as well. We draw strength from him to persevere.



THE ELEVENTH STATION

Leader: Eleventh Station: Jesus is mocked by the crowds We adore you O Christ and we praise you.

All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

(Matthew 27:39-44)

Meditation: The crowds seem eager to mock the Lord, to use his words to discredit him.

Do we jump at the chance to prove another wrong?

Do we seek ways to discredit another?

The real tragedy in this scene may be the fact that the crowds are seeking to discredit God and his preaching.

The question that comes to mind is: where does that leave them?

If they discredit and reject the one who is love, goodness and beauty, what is left?

All: Our Father

THE TWELFTH STATION

Leader: Twelfth Station: Jesus dies on the CrossWe adore you O Christ and we praise you.All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

(Matthew 27:45-50)

Meditation: So ends the struggle. The end of the troublesome preacher. Nothing is more powerful than death, right?

The story doesn't end on a hillside outside of Jerusalem. It leads us to Easter joy, to new and everlasting life.





THE THIRTEENTH STATION

Leader: Thirteenth Station: Women at the CrossWe adore you O Christ and we praise you.All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

(Matthew 25:55-56)

Meditation: Not all those who loved Jesus fled. The men fled, the women stayed.

Two of those women are identified as "mother". St. John tells us that he also stayed as did Jesus' mother Mary.

What strength motherhood must require!

To put aside fear in order to remain focused on the one loved, whether one's own child or another's.

Such discipline, determination and courage inspires and teaches. It witnesses to the power of love.

Do I have that same strength? The same discipline, determination and courage? Do I flee from God in the face of fear?

All: Our Father

THE FOURTEENTH STATION

Leader: Fourteenth Station: The burial of JesusWe adore you O Christ and we praise you.All: Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the world.

(Matthew 27:57-60)

Meditation: To bury the dead—one of the Corporal Works of Mercy. The other Works are: feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, shelter the homeless, visit the sick, visit the imprisoned).

These actions flow from our love of God and Neighbor.





Final Meditation


Heavenly Father,

(Repeat 3 times) O Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the Heart of Jesus as a fountain of Mercy for us, I trust in You!

Our Father, Hail Mary and the Apostle's Creed

For each of the five decades (On each "Our Father" bead of the rosary, pray)

Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your Dearly Beloved Son, Our Lord, Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.

(On each of the 10 "Hail Ma<mark>ry" beads, pray</mark>) For the sake of His sorrow<mark>ful Passion, have</mark> mercy on us and on the whole world.

Concluding prayer (Repeat 3 times) Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

Optional Closing Prayer

Eternal God, in whom mercy is endless and the treasury of compassion inexhaustible, look kindly upon us and increase Your mercy in us, that in difficult moments we might not despair nor become despondent, but with great confidence submit ourselves to Your holy will, which is Love and Mercy itself.
